When all four of us had arrived, we were rushed into a school van along with the escorting teacher Mrs. Shanthi. And so, we set out on our little trip to Indian High School. On arriving, the sights we saw left us spell-bound. 'Chhatris' of the type that were used by the rajas of olden times were held up by staff and students dressed in the colourful traditional wear. It was a splendid way to begin Van Mahotsav.

An escort met us at the gate and led us further into the school where we witnessed the music band and a group of Bharatanatyam dancers. Once we reached this point, two of us were invited to take part in the planting of the trees while our teacher and the other students made their way to the auditorium.

The two of us were each positioned next to a sapling. Each of us was also accompanied by two representatives of the school. There were also ambassadors from other schools. The chief guests arrived to the sound of trumpets and drums and the sight of spectacular dancing.
